2 (Following recitation of the Pledge of  
3 Allegiance, the meeting was called to order.)

4 MAYOR McGINTY: Madam Clerk, we are  
5 going to call the meeting to order for a  
6 discussion on public hearings; is that correct?

7 MS. CONROY: Yes, Mayor.

8 MAYOR McGINTY: So the meeting has  
9 been called to order at six forty-five. Roll  
10 call, please.

11 MS. CONROY: Trustee Barbara  
12 Volpe-Ried.

13 TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: Present.

14 MS. CONROY: Trustee Matthew Paccione.

15 MAYOR McGINTY: En route.

16 MS. CONROY: Trustee Irene Naudus.

17 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Family emergency.

18 MS. CONROY: Deputy Mayor Trustee  
19 Joseph Annarella.

20 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Present.

21 MS. CONROY: Village Attorney Anthony  
22 Cornacho.

23 MR. CORNACHO: Excused.

24 MS. CONROY: And Mayor Michael  
25 McGinty.

2 MAYOR MCGINTY: Here. We are here for  
3 public hearings on several local laws. The  
4 first is a public hearing to consider the  
5 adoption of Local Law 1, Building Construction  
6 Administration. The purpose is to require the  
7 installation of six foot construction fencing at  
8 specified locations. Simply put, John and Mary  
9 Smith are doing work on a house, raising the  
10 house, extensive work. We want a six foot fence  
11 to protect everybody. This is the local law for  
12 six foot fences. Comments? Thoughts? Hearing  
13 none, motion to close the hearing.

14 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: So move.

15 TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: Second.

16 MAYOR MCGINTY: On the motion? Aye.

17 (Whereupon, all Board members voted  
18 affirmatively.)

19 MAYOR MCGINTY: The second public  
20 hearing is to consider the adoption of Local Law  
21 2, building construction administration. The  
22 purpose of this proposed local law is to define  
23 permitted contractor hours. For example,  
24 erection, including excavation, demolition,  
25 alteration or repair of any out building other

2    than the hours of eight a.m. to six p.m.  
3    weekdays nine to five p.m. on Saturday is  
4    prohibited. Outside those hours are prohibited.

5           (Trustee Paccione arrived at 6:54  
6    p.m.)

7           MAYOR McGINTY: We closed the hearing  
8    on the six foot construction fencing and we are  
9    on the hours of operation for contractors.  
10   Comments on the proposed local law. Seeing no  
11   comments, motion to close the hearing, please?

12           TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: So move.

13           TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Second.

14           MAYOR McGINTY: On the motion? Aye.

15           (Whereupon, all Board members voted  
16   affirmatively.)

17           MAYOR McGINTY: Local Law 3. The  
18   purpose of this local law is to establish  
19   regulations for management and ownership of  
20   animals. It's just a discussion of limited dogs  
21   in a home of four. We are not going to permit  
22   tethering dogs outside for any length of time  
23   and we describe the violations and penalties.  
24   That is about the long and short of it. On the  
25   hearing, any comment?

2 MS. ROTHMAN: Debra Rothman, 154  
3 McKinley Avenue, Island Park. Is there any  
4 limit on cats?

5 MAYOR McGINTY: This is not about  
6 cats. No, ma'am.

7 MR. ZIMATORE: Roland Zimatore, 185  
8 Suffolk Road. Outside lengthy time, what is  
9 considered a lengthy time for a dog to be out  
10 there barking away?

11 MAYOR McGINTY: Two continuous hours.  
12 Questions, comments?

13 MS. ROTHMAN: Is there any time  
14 restriction besides the two hours during certain  
15 hours? Can you do it from eleven p.m. to one  
16 a.m.?

17 MAYOR McGINTY: There is no time  
18 restrictions here. Parenthetically they're  
19 aught to be a certain amount of common sense.  
20 Motion to close the hearing.

21 TRUSTEE PACCIONE: So move.

22 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Second.

23 MAYOR McGINTY: Proposed Local Law  
24 Number 4, strengthen the violation section for  
25 maintenance of properties. Literally to

2   strengthen the code so we have a better handle;  
3   very similar to the codification last year when  
4   we were able to cut and maintain properties in  
5   an expedited fashion for the good of the  
6   Village. Any comments or questions? Seeing  
7   none, motion to close the hearing.

8           TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Make a motion.

9           TRUSTEE PACCIONE: Second.

10          MAYOR MCGINTY: On the motion. Aye.

11          (Whereupon, all Board members voted  
12   affirmatively.)

13          MAYOR MCGINTY: Last local law  
14   proposed is strengthen the penalties for  
15   offenses on building construction difficulties.  
16   For example, we are talking about fines  
17   beginning at two fifty, not exceeding twenty  
18   five hundred on the first offense. The second  
19   offense five hundred and five thousand. Third  
20   offense one thousand to ten thousand. On the  
21   hearing? No response. Motion to close.

22          TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: So move.

23          TRUSTEE PACCIONE: Second.

24          MAYOR MCGINTY: On the motion. Aye.

25          (Whereupon, all Board members voted

3                   MAYOR MCGINTY:   How about Recreation  
4   and Beach please?   Trustee Volpe-Ried.

5                   TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED:   Masone Beach  
6   remains open to the public weekdays and weekends  
7   nine a.m. to sunset, weather permitting.  
8   Currently we are in the process of creating our  
9   2017 concert series to be held at Masone Beach  
10   as well as Masone Beach movie night.   If anybody  
11   has suggestions, please feel free to contact me.  
12   Easter on the beach also.   Any questions about  
13   any kind of sponsorship, please call the Village  
14   and leave a message for me.   Respectfully  
15   submitted.

16                  MAYOR MCGINTY:   Thank you, Trustee  
17   Volpe-Ried.   Trustee Paccione, Public Safety.

18                  TRUSTEE PACCIONE:   Public Safety.  
19   Nassau County Police, nine arrests.   Thirty-four  
20   tickets for moving violations, thirty-three  
21   parkers, forty-two aided cases.   One burglary  
22   was reported on 1/5, a commercial building on  
23   Long Beach Road.

24                  The fire department calls, there were  
25   forty-seven rescues, one house fire, two house

2   fire alarms. One building fire. Two carbon  
3   dioxide detector activation. One unknown fire.  
4   One downed wire, one Hazmat, three Hazmat for  
5   natural gas exterior. Mutual aid stand-by  
6   ambulance and a mutual aid stand-by with ladder  
7   for a total of seventy-two calls.

8           TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: The Planning and  
9   Zoning Report for February. Building permits  
10   were issued for the following addresses for  
11   Superstorm Sandy related repairs in January:  
12   Number 12 Lorraine Road. 78 Marina Road and 2  
13   Parente Road North.

14           Building permits. 51 Deal Road. 5  
15   Hastings Road. 47 Kildare Road. 6 Lancaster

17   Ostend Road. 2 Parente Lane North. 56  
18   Radcliffe Road. 145 Radcliffe. 57 Roosevelt  
19   Place. 10 Washington Place. 77 Waterford Road.  
20   89 Waterford Road and 131 Waterford Road.

21           Certificate of Completion was issued

2   Waterford and 97 Waterford Road.

3                   The following were heard on January  
4   25th: 1.17 Cody, 133 Nassau Lane. The  
5   following will be heard February 22nd, ZBA  
6   hearings: 2.17 Zeng, 49 Redfield Road and 3.17  
7   Zurita at 87 Nassau Lane. That is the report.

8                   MAYOR McGINTY: Thank you. Public  
9   Works?

10                  TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Public Works  
11   report. The following was collected in January:  
12   Two hundred seventeen point zero two tons  
13   municipal solid wait. Eleven point five tons of  
14   mixed glass. All street lights and meters  
15   reported not working are being repaired. All  
16   Village owned property is being maintained.

17                  Just a reminder, there will be no  
18   garbage pick-up this Monday for Presidents Day.  
19   The DPW, I thought they did a fine job during  
20   the last storm. We only had minor repairs done  
21   to the snow equipment. Potholes will be filled  
22   as soon as we can get to them. That is my  
23   report.

24                  MAYOR McGINTY: Thank you. I was up  
25   in Walden & Associates in Oyster Bay this



1                   2/16/17 Board of Trustees meeting  
2 morning. We have had ongoing meetings as they  
3 relate to the hazard mitigation grant program.  
4 The gist of it is that we are going to submit a  
5 report to the government, that is FEMA and  
6 Homeland Security and Governor's Office on or  
7 about March 1st so we will be well within the  
8 guidelines. That report will detail our next --  
9 the beginning of the next phase for the drainage  
10 project.

11                   As you know, we cleaned all the drains  
12 and drain boxes within the Village that served  
13 two general purposes. The first purpose,  
14 obviously clean them, better drainage. The  
15 second was to take measurements on all of the  
16 inverts, all of the low and high points in the  
17 drains. Literally to find out which way the  
18 water was running. We, by using our own  
19 containment area, by building a containment area  
20 behind the Public Works garage, with direct  
21 supervision from the New York State DEC, we were  
22 able to save one million one hundred forty some  
23 odd thousand dollars of the initial cleaning  
24 phase of the project. And the government agreed  
25 to roll back one point one million over the next

2 phase of the project.

3           In addition, I can't say it strong  
4 enough, the New York State DEC has used our  
5 containment area as a model for other  
6 communities. Very important to us. We realize  
7 that you can't just take a bulldozer and rip up  
8 every road in the Village all at once. What we  
9 are doing now is laying out a hierarchy of value  
10 on the trouble spots, the drainage trouble spots  
11 and start with that. So we will be meeting to  
12 discuss the initial phase for plans, the design  
13 phase to go forward.

14           Before I continue, Sergeant, sir, I  
15 must tell you, your efforts are well appreciated  
16 around here.

17           SERGEANT ANDRUK: Thank you. I  
18 appreciate that.

19           MAYOR MCGINTY: Your report.

20           SERGEANT ANDRUK: My report for  
21 January. It's a little bit quieter. Nine  
22 arrests in Island Park, thirty-four moving  
23 violations, thirty-three parking violations,  
24 forty-two aided cases. If you don't know, that  
25 is any case involving medical assistance where

2   an ambulance is called. And one burglary  
3   report, a commercial building on Long Beach  
4   Road. That's all we have for January. Does  
5   anybody have any questions or concerns?

6           MR. DeMATTEO: Nick DeMatteo, 19  
7   Redfield Road. There is nothing mentioned about  
8   the woman on Waterford Road. You know nothing  
9   about it?

10          SERGEANT ANDRUK: No.

11          MR. DeMATTEO: That night, I was  
12   parking my car in my garage and two people came  
13   up to me from Channel 7 News and started asking  
14   me questions. They said, you seen anything on  
15   Waterford Road? I said yeah, I seen two Nassau  
16   county cops in front of this house.

17          I want to tell you something, this  
18   woman that is living there, she's not the  
19   landlord, she had an eight year old son in her  
20   house by herself. She died in her car. She  
21   shot herself with a needle in her ear and went  
22   across two lanes of traffic and hit a storage  
23   bin in front of the Long Beach Fire Department.

24          When the cops went to see her, they  
25   noticed that thing in the ear. They give her

2   that stuff in the nose that saved her life.  
3   This happened maybe a couple of months before  
4   that, her husband on Waterford Road again, I  
5   said this to the Board when it happened. There  
6   was an unmarked car, dressed like normal people.  
7   They pulled this car over from that house. It  
8   was the husband from this woman. There was a  
9   kid in the back seat of the car. When the cops  
10   checked, they found all kinds of drugs in the  
11   trunk. They handcuffed him and waited for the  
12   woman that owns the house for someone to pick  
13   this kid up.

14           What I'm saying, I don't know, you  
15   don't know about this here. When it comes to  
16   drugs, I get crazy. When I see a kid eight  
17   years old getting involved. There is a school  
18   bus stop right on my corner. What happens, she  
19   came out of the house and shot herself up and  
20   killed all those kids over there on the corner?  
21   If people see something, they should say  
22   something.

23           Another thing I found out, there is  
24   another house on 56 Suffolk Road. There is a  
25   house they're owned by Tony Angello. He's not

2   there. He's living somewhere else. His son is  
3   there. They're dealing drugs out of that house.  
4   There are people coming in. They step on a  
5   stool, they go through the window to get their  
6   drugs. It's a one family home, there is three  
7   families now.

8           There are all kinds of activities  
9   going on all night long. Years ago the cops  
10   would come and stay there and watch the house.  
11   Why isn't that done any more?

12           SERGEANT ANDRUK: They have been doing  
13   a lot of activity in Oceanside.

14           TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: They have been  
15   down Waterford Road. I've seen them.

16           MR. DeMATTEO: They stopped the  
17   undercover. That is the number one no-no that  
18   they stopped that. I'm not blaming you.

19           SERGEANT ANDRUK: We are trying to get  
20   that back. It looks like it should be coming  
21   back in the next thirty days.

22           MR. DeMATTEO: It's all over Nassau  
23   and Suffolk. It's all over Island Park. The  
24   Board should really do something about this  
25   here. You have to do something because it's

2   going on and on. We could be walking across the  
3   street. They could kill you. This is crazy.  
4   This one on Suffolk, there's a big thing going  
5   on there.

6           SERGEANT ANDRUK: I made notations of  
7   that. We don't have an undercover unit per se  
8   right now but we have a lot of extra officers  
9   working at night. When those extra officers are  
10   working we put them in plain clothes cars if we  
11   can. I think we have one tonight. I'll  
12   definitely advise them to go over there.

13           MR. DeMATTEO: The people see this,  
14   they called me today because they seen me on TV  
15   about this kid. But something has to be done in  
16   this village. Mr. Mayor, I'm sorry I'm talking  
17   this way. Something has to be going on in the  
18   village about the drugs.

19           TRUSTEE PACCIONE: Just because you  
20   don't see us out there doing it, we have been  
21   behind the scenes with the police. It is being  
22   worked on.

23           MR. DeMATTEO: You just pass the house  
24   and you keep going or do you stop and sit there  
25   and wait and see what is happening in the house?

2 TRUSTEE PACCIONE: I leave that for  
3 the police. That is not my job.

4 MAYOR MCGINTY: Hold on a second.  
5 First of all, for the record, I resent -- are  
6 you listening to me -- I resent your comment,  
7 number one. Number two, six months back, one  
8 o'clock in the morning, Trustee Paccione and I  
9 were on Quebec Road and Blackstone Walk. We  
10 made sure a house was boarded up. And we swore  
11 out a complaint with the red headed sergeant.

12 SERGEANT ANDRUK: Sergeant Field.

13 MAYOR MCGINTY: So we are in the  
14 middle of things around here. There were  
15 complaints about a house on Kildare Road. One  
16 evening your buddy over here, my wife and I, we  
17 drove by that house every two hours. And at  
18 least two of those trips down Kildare Road we  
19 had a radio car following us or in front of  
20 us.

21 TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: A few times I had  
22 a phone call. I called the police department.

23 MAYOR MCGINTY: Ostend Road, whatever  
24 the house is, I think it's 82. We, I don't want  
25 to say "forced" but we had a great impact on the

2 owner of that house evicting the second floor  
3 tenants for drug related activities.

4           As far as Suffolk Road goes, on 56  
5 Suffolk Road specifically, we had some cars  
6 towed out of there. We have been very active.

7           MR. DeMATTEO: You know there is a  
8 three family house there?

9           MAYOR McGINTY: Mr. DeMatteo, I don't  
10 miss too much. I know a lot of stuff.

11          MR. DeMATTEO: What is being done with  
12 the house?

13          MAYOR McGINTY: Right now it's under  
14 active investigation.

15          MR. DeMATTEO: You don't know anything  
16 about it. What is right is right. He didn't  
17 know anything about it.

18          SERGEANT ANDRUK: I'm not the one out  
19 there doing the checks. I'm supervising.

20          MAYOR McGINTY: Mr. DeMatteo, we are  
21 out there actively. The police are out there  
22 actively. Just because you say it's so there  
23 still has to be a procedure followed and it's  
24 being followed.

25          SERGEANT ANDRUK: There needs to be

2    due process.

3           MAYOR McGINTY: Thank you. Any other  
4    comments or questions?

5           MR. ROTHMAN: Jan Rothman. You  
6    mentioned one burglary on Long Beach Road  
7    January 5th. Is that the Methodist church or  
8    you're not at liberty to say.

9           SERGEANT ANDRUK: I don't know if it  
10   was the Methodist church or not. I'm not a  
11   hundred percent certain. It wasn't anything  
12   really big or noteworthy that is really actively  
13   being investigated. It happens a lot, where you  
14   get a gas station robbed overnight, someone  
15   throws a rock through a window.

16           We have a couple of pattern burglaries  
17   happening, like bagel places, breakfast places,  
18   things like that in Oceanside, Rockville Centre,  
19   Baldwin, in that area.

20           We have another one happening in the  
21   western part of the precinct, but nothing that  
22   is a pattern or recurring in this area.

23           MR. ROTHMAN: There was a photo on  
24   Facebook about a security camera robbing the  
25   Methodist church. I heard the other day there

2    was something at St. Anthony's in Oceanside.

3           SERGEANT ANDRUK: The burglary in  
4    January was January 5th.

5           MR. ROTHMAN: St. Anthony's was  
6    Sunday.

7           SERGEANT ANDRUK: Absolutely, just to  
8    let you know the inspector is working hard to  
9    get those units back. Have a good night,  
10   everybody.

11           (Whereupon, Sergeant Andruk exited the  
12    proceedings.)

13           MAYOR MCGINTY: To continue, the  
14    resiliency and hardening of the emergency  
15    management center, which is the second floor of  
16    the firehouse is progressing. The Village has  
17    signed a contract with H2M for architectural  
18    engineering services, so the project is off and  
19    running. We are working with the Governor's  
20    Office, directly with the Governor's Office on  
21    the transit oriented planning study for the Long  
22    Beach Road business corridor, and the bank  
23    property is included in the process as well as  
24    some other properties.

25           We entered into a project to replace



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2   fuel tanks at the DPW garage. We are  
3   undertaking to enter into a municipal agreement  
4   with the Town of Hempstead to use their  
5   facilities to fuel up our vehicles at the  
6   appropriate times, and what that means to the  
7   taxpayer is a continuation of wholesale  
8   government prices as opposed to pulling up to a  
9   commercial tank. That is important to us.

10           We are exploring the installation of  
11   state of the art parking meters by the railroad  
12   substation. I will be in the building  
13   specifically Saturday the 25th, nine to noon.  
14   Frankly, you all know I'm around all the time,  
15   one place or another.

16           So ends my report. Madam Clerk, shall  
17   we begin our resolutions for the evening?

18           MS. CONROY: Resolved that the  
19   abstract of audited vouchers for the month of  
20   January 2017 be approved for payment.

21           TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Motion.

22           TRUSTEE PACCIONE: Second.

23           MAYOR MCGINTY: On the motion.

24           (Whereupon, all Board members voted  
25   affirmatively.)
