3 Allegiance, the meeting was called to order.)

4 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: Madam Clerk,
5 would you read the roll.

6 MS. CONROY: Trustee Barbara
7 Volpe-Ried.

8 TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: Here.

9 MS. CONROY: Trustee Matthew Paccione.

10 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Absent.

11 MS. CONROY: Trustee Irene Naudus.

12 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Present.

13 MS. CONROY: Deputy Mayor Joseph
14 Annarella.

15 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Here.

16 MS. CONROY: Village Attorney Susan
17 Boland.

18 MS. BOLAND: Here.

19 MS. CONROY: Public hearing to
20 consider the adoption of Local Law Number 13 of
21 the year 2017, amending Local Law 2 of 2014,
22 amending 2 of 2012, amending Local Law 1 of 1999
23 entitled Vehicle and Traffic Law, Article 7,
24 Section 71, Schedule 13, entitled Parking
25 Prohibited at All Times.

2 The purpose of the proposed local law
3 is to restrict parking at certain locations
4 throughout the Village. The first location is
5 Quebec Road, both sides, the entire length of
6 the traffic circle that is located at the
7 southern end of Quebec Road. The second
8 location is Newport Road, west side, from
9 Landgraf Lane, south thirty seven feet.

10 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: I'd like to
11 open up the hearing to the public on those two
12 streets. Any comment?

13 (No comment from the audience.)

14 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: Close the
15 hearing. Go to the Trustees' reports.

16 MR. ROTHMAN: Can we start the meeting
17 before seven o'clock? I know the meeting is
18 supposed to start at seven o'clock and there are
19 a lot of people coming down.

20 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: We are expecting
21 Nassau County Police Department to be here and a
22 representative of the Long Island Railroad.
23 They said they change the shift at seven
24 o'clock. We will start our open meeting. Once
25 they come in, we will stop. So anyone that has

2 any questions, we will let you guys ask them and
3 then we will finish our open meeting.

4 TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: I would like to
5 thank you all once again for participating in
6 such a wonderful summer season. The support of
7 the Village residents is a great attribute that
8 helps Masone Beach grow each summer.

9 There are two concerts remaining this
10 summer with our annual fireworks display. All
11 concerts begin at seven-thirty and we have
12 rescheduled Friday's concert, High Tide, to
13 Wednesday, August 30th instead of tomorrrw night
14 because they're expecting rain, and Saturday,
15 September 2nd, Jersey Five with the fireworks to
16 follow.

17 We would like to thank South Point
18 Plaza Nursing Home and Rehabilitation Center for
19 contributing with sponsoring our summer movie
20 nights. There the are two movies remaining this
21 summer. All start at eight-fifteen. The rain
22 dates are on the Village website. Sunday,
23 August 20th is Beauty and the Beast and Sunday,
24 August 27th is Jaws. Banners and posters are on
25 display for all times and dates both concerts

3 Village as well as storefronts for the residents
4 and passersby to see.

5 Masone Beach gazebo summer rentals are
6 on sale. For Island Park residents the fee is
7 one hundred twenty-five and non-residents will
8 be two twenty-five for all gazebo rentals. All
9 information regarding gazebo rentals can be
10 found on the Village website. The Village
11 website has all the dates for Masone Beach
12 regarding events, including bingo night and
13 paint and sip night. Any questions about

16 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: I'll start with
17 Planning and Zoning. Building permits were

8 I have the code enforcement report.
9 No parking permit, thirty-two. Expired meter,
10 thirty seven. Out of stall, eighteen. Backed
11 into stall, twenty-two. Fire hydrant, one. No
12 commercial parking, three. Bus parking, nine.
13 Restricted parking, twenty-four. Blocking
14 driveway, one. Double parking, one. Parked on
15 sidewalk, two. Alternate parking, sixty-five.
16 Left to curb, one. Parked in intersection, one.
17 Twenty-five expired inspections and seventeen
18 expired inspections over sixty days. Total of
19 two hundred seventy-five tickets given out.
20 Respectfully submitted.

21 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: Would you
22 like to come here? We have Deputy Inspector
23 Tara Kaminsky from the 4th Precinct. Thank you
24 for coming down. Hector Garcia from the Long
25 Island Railroad. We will switch gears and come

2 back to the regular agenda after they're done.

3 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: I was only told
4 about this meeting this morning. If I don't
5 have the answer to your question, I have my
6 notebook; I'll write to down.

7 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: Name and
8 address. One person at a time. Give it to the
9 reporter here.

10 MR. ROTHMAN: Jan Rothman, 154 McKinley
11 Avenue, Island Park. We have a big problem in
12 this village with vagrants. People from the
13 group home on Quebec roaming the streets,
14 constantly harassing people, interfering with
15 the operation of businesses. I know of at least
16 three business owners here who have businesses
17 around here on Long Beach Road who have
18 complained. They stroll into their businesses.
19 Carlos, who runs Fluffy Angels, doesn't like it.
20 We are not happy with the people who are roaming
21 our streets.

22 Within the last week I was personally
23 harassed three times by vagrants who hang out in
24 front of the food store, the vacant stores
25 between -- to the north side of the food store.

2 They just hang out there all day. These people
3 have no place to go, nothing to do. They walk
4 into Josephine's business, they grub cigarettes
5 from her customers. They walk into Carlos'
6 place and Christopher's place.

7 What do we do? How do we get rid of
8 the problem? I don't know if the Board can
9 solve the problem. I don't know if it's a
10 police problem. This is the only forum I know
11 to bring it up. I personally, I was walking
12 from DaVinci's, the synagogue Friday night,
13 well, the two don't go together. Whatever. We
14 are not judgemental. As I walked past the food
15 store I was harassed by these people.

16 I came off the train Monday night,
17 seven, an obviously mentally disturbed person
18 kind of a large guy standing in the shelter, the
19 little shelters that are on the platform goes
20 like "arrrr." He has like two teeth in his head,
21 big bulging eyes and two women behind me. I
22 don't need this. I don't need to be harassed by
23 these people. The last night, the same group
24 hanging out on the bench by the station. The
25 one gentleman, there is a picture on Facebook

2 today, thanks to Chris, half naked. Kind of
3 exposing everything under his sweat pants.

4 This is not what we need to see. We
5 are losing our village. People are afraid to
6 walk up and down Long Beach Road. I don't have
7 to be harassed on my way to synagogue. I don't
8 want to be harassed if I want to bring my dogs
9 in to be groomed by Carlos. I don't know how to
10 solve the problem. I know how to make you aware
11 of the problem. I think that is the reason for
12 a lot of the people being here tonight. I don't
13 know if it's a Village problem and I don't know
14 what the Village can do about it. But it's out
15 there.

16 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: If something is
17 happening at a particular time, you can call
18 911. A lot of people say it's not an emergency,
19 I don't want to call 911, but it's the quickest
20 way to get an officer down there.

21 MR. ROTHMAN: It's not only that.
22 They just hang out there all day. I want it
23 looks like -- I don't want to say the wrong
24 thing. I'm living here forty years. It's never
25 been this bad. I'm embarrassed. I tell my

2 friends to come to my house, drive that way,
3 don't come downtown. It's on the verge of being
4 disgusting. Sorry guys, but --

5 MS. SCULLY: Roberta Scully. I'm
6 inactive, but I have a real estate office which
7 my son runs on Long Beach Road. Arlington Walk
8 runs along there. Occasionally there are people
9 lurking there in the dark. There are no real
10 lights there. I have a granddaughter who has a
11 lot of friends. She always walks around in a
12 group, which we encourage her to do, but it's
13 kind of scary.

14 You're right, we should call 911, but
15 you can stand there all day long and call 911
16 every fifteen minutes. It's something, they go
17 away and come back. I don't know what the
18 answer is. I don't know if you should --
19 ARLINGTON Walk, people get off the train, they
20 walk there. It's a shortcut to get -- they use
21 that. It's kind of scary there.

22 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: Any lighting
23 issues, that would be addressed to the Board.

24 MS. SCULLY: Whatever. If there are
25 people lurking there, wouldn't that be a police

2 issue?

3 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: If somebody
4 harasses you that is when you call 911.

5 MS. SCULLY: I have to wait until my
6 granddaughter is harassed, is that what you are
7 saying?

8 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: If someone is
9 walking there, you are allowed to walk.

10 MS. SCULLY: They're not walking,
11 they're lurking. I know that the code
12 enforcement officer, I see him driving around
13 Island Park all the time. He's trying to do a
14 good job. We used to have an auxiliary police
15 force which the Village said a couple of years
16 ago they would get back, but it it never
17 happened. When we had the auxiliary police
18 department -- Joe you can attest to this. We
19 did talk about it at one time.

20 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: When the
21 people that wanted to do do it, when they found
22 out the training to do it, they didn't have the
23 time in their life to do it.

24 MS. SCULLY: Maybe it's time to look
25 at it again because something has to be done.

2 It's like Jan is saying, it's getting to the
3 point where I seldom go into the Village at
4 night. I go to bed at eight o'clock. When I do
5 go out, I'm really surprised. I want the
6 Village to be the way it used to be. I'm sorry.

7 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: There was a
8 hand in the back before. You in the back. Name
9 and address for the record.

10 MS. REICHEL: Terry Reichel, 54
11 Waterford Road. I agree a hundred percent with
12 everything that both of you stated. We can't
13 let our children off to the beach, walk to
14 Jack's for a slice of pizza. It's hurting our
15 businesses, it's hurting our children, it's
16 hurting our families. Seriously, something has
17 to be done about it. It's like tenfold what it
18 was six months ago. It's getting worse and
19 worse.

20 The train station issue is horrendous.
21 It's absolutely out of control what is going on
22 in our train station. That building that is
23 supposed to be closed as of August 2nd, I
24 believe. I checked at six-thirty tonight. It
25 was still open. Luckily, there was nobody

2 hanging out in there doing what we have all
3 witnessed in person or on Facebook.

4 A friend of mine takes the train home
5 at night. She is scared to walk to her car.
6 That is completely unacceptable. I'm scared to
7 let my children to take the Long Island Railroad
8 into the city to go to a concert. Rules are not
9 being followed. People have to be held
10 accountable.

11 If you are double parked at any time
12 of day, as much as we try, as our Board tries or
13 code enforcer tries, he can't be everywhere at
14 one time. Four cars double parked in front of
15 the bodega. That is hurting everyone because
16 there is going to be another accident on the
17 corner. It happens all the time. We are very
18 upset.

19 Anybody that comes to the Village
20 meetings on a regular basis knows this room is
21 filled compared to what the meetings were. That
22 should show you that we are not happy. I want
23 to let everyone in the room know. Nassau county
24 Police Department Comes when they're called.
25 MTA comes when they're called. MTA Police

2 Department has a protocol to follow. If someone

3 in that building has a ticket for a train,

4 they're allowed to sit in that station. If they

5 don't have one, they need to leave. However,

6 they do have tickets on them for the purpose of

7 saying, I have a ticket. MTA police has a

8 procedure where they will mark that ticket and

9 they will check back in a certain amount of

10 time. Nine times out of ten, that person still

11 has not gotten on a train. The ticket is

12 initialed by an MTA police officer and they will

13 take the ticket and say, "you have to leave."

14 You need to call the number inside the

15 building if you are not happy with conditions or

16 what is going on in there. That is going to

17 make the Long Island Railroad very unhappy and

18 hopefully take extra steps. Repeated calls, if

19 you see something at the railroad, repeated. If

20 you have to call twice a day that you see

21 something that isn't right. No one is going to

22 take any action here from the railroad -- no

23 disrespect to you -- unless they are bothered by

24 coming here every day multiple times a day.

25 I don't work with the Long Island

2 police. I'm close with someone who does. That
3 is where this advice is coming from. Do what
4 you have to do. Ask for help with what we need
5 get done. I grew up here, my husband grew up
6 here, we have four kids and we are very anxious
7 about what is going on, as is everybody that is
8 in this room.

9 As far as the house I know some
10 members on the Board and some residents had a
11 meeting with the supervisor of that building.

12 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: Are we on the
13 SAIL house?

14 MS. REICHEL: Yes.

15 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: The Mayor and
16 Trustee Volpe-Ried met with them. A certain
17 individual was removed from that establishment.
18 There is another meeting coming up in the second
19 week in September to continue the dialogue.
20 That will be taken care of.

21 MS. REICHEL: There is a lot of
22 comments about why hadn't anybody addressed it.
23 It has been addressed. I wasn't there but I
24 know it's been addressed, and I know that the
25 Board has been working diligently with them.

2 Going on Facebook is not going to help anything.
3 If our Village doesn't know specific names for
4 pictures of people that are harassing customers
5 and hurting businesses, they can't do anything
6 about it. You need to go to the Village Board
7 and let them know specifics.

8 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: That place
9 isn't a jail. Most people are allowed out.
10 They're allowed to walk the streets. Once they
11 become a nuisance and there can be a case built
12 up against them, they can be removed from there,
13 but they have rights too. There are certain
14 rules that they have to follow.

15 MS. REICHEL: I'm not placing blame on
16 anybody there. I'm trying to let everyone in
17 the room know, if there is a problem, you have
18 to bring it to the attention of somebody who can
19 help.

20 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: That brings
21 us an issue to the meeting. It gives us
22 documentation and dates. This same person is a
23 problem, and that will give them a reason to
24 remove them.

25 MS. REICHEL: I'm not saying anything

2 bad about people going on Facebook and sharing
3 information, but it can't stop there. They need
4 to come here and everybody needs to work
5 together.

6 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: Bring your
7 concerns to the Village Hall, Nassau County 4th
8 Precinct, Long Island Railroad. We have
9 meetings and dialogues with these agencies. We
10 are concerned with the issues like you are.
11 It's not being ignored. It's being looked at.
12 Sometimes things take awhile.

13 MS. REICHEL: We know it's not being
14 ignored. We are just saying we have to do more.
15 I'm done with my lecturing. I'll post the
16 numbers on Facebook. Barbara, thank you very
17 much. At the beach, it's been fabulous.

18 MR. BILARDELLO: David B-I-L-A-R-D-E-L-L-O,
19 26 Lancaster Road. With reference to all the
20 people hanging out in front of the storefronts,
21 is there a way that the stores can put up no
22 loitering signs? The business owners should, by
23 right, tell the people, by right, if are you not
24 going to buy anything, you can't hang out in
25 front of my storefront. Businesses should step

2 up too and say to these people shoo. You can't
3 just hang around in front of my store.

4 The double parking signs, tell. DPW
5 there is no double parking signs there you can't
6 make a right turn. If they put up a sign.

7 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: There is no
8 double parking you don't put up a sign for that
9 you give a ticket for that.

10 MR. BILARDELLO: Everybody does it.
11 They just do what they want to do.

12 MS. LOBEL: Josephine Lobel, 33 Parma
13 Road. I just wanted to say people when we as a
14 business owner we tell them to move it long
15 there from that home and they completely curse
16 you out in front of all your customers. Its
17 embarrassing, it's terrible for the business and
18 terrible for the community.

19 I understand, I don't know what can be
20 done. It's a state furnished run home. These
21 people should be in therapy. They should be
22 being taught in workshops to be taught how ot
23 live in society.

24 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: You don't know what
25 they're being taught.

2 MS. LOBEL: Yes, I do. I watch them
3 from morning to night. They do nothing but walk
4 up and down the street from morning 'till night.
5 The man standing with his zipper down and stands
6 in front of my store. I'm sick of it. I have a
7 lot of money invested in this town and I'm not
8 going to deal with it.

9 MS. SCULLY: Is there any ordinance
10 that says you can't walk around with your zipper
11 open?

12 TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: We did explain.
13 They're allowed to go out and I said how can
14 that be. You have to teach them how to walk
15 around. You were there.

16 MS. LOBEL: We need a better police
17 presence there. The police have to be not
18 driving up and down the road walking. I want to
19 them to see what I see. I want them to -- I'm
20 afraid to send my son to the school bus stop.
21 Why do I have to live like that? Unacceptable,
22 completely.

23 MS. SCULLY: I agree.

24 MR. MOTISI: Chris M-O-T-I-S-I, 140
25 Long Beach Road. I will touch base on a few

2 things we just spoke about. I'm on the corner
3 yesterday. I literally watched a woman with her
4 children grab them and walk the other way
5 because of this guy walking the street. It's
6 not just him. There are several of them
7 literally standing there all day long. They
8 don't do anything, except the black guy standing
9 there smoking cigarettes, "hey man, can I get a
10 dollar. Can I get a dollar."

11 I own a business on this corner. She
12 owns a business. There are other business
13 owners here. We have to deal with that on a
14 daily basis. It deters business. I don't shop
15 anywhere because I don't want to deal with these
16 people. And I live here and I own my business
17 here and I want to expand my business here, but
18 I don't want to do that with the vagrants and
19 the trash that we have to deal with on a daily
20 basis.

21 I have a little cousin that drives his
22 bike around. I told him stay away from uptown.
23 Don't come over here. I don't want to see you
24 here. My cousin, she is afraid to let her son
25 go to the school bus. Why is nothing happening?

2 I called the police. It took them fifteen
3 minutes or more to get here yesterday. I told
4 them that two people were fighting, throwing
5 bottles at each other. Fifteen to twenty
6 minutes later.

7 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: What time?

8 MR. MOTISI: I don't remember the
9 time. It's unacceptable.

10 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: Where was the
11 call location?

12 MR. MOTISI: From over here.

13 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: Where was the
14 address that you called the incident in?

15 MR. MOTISI: 147 Long Beach Road.

16 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: Do you know
17 around what time it was?

18 MR. KAMIZ: Not sure.

19 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: It took the
20 officer fifteen to twenty minutes to get here?

21 MR. MOTISI: I own a bar. I'm by no
22 means saying my customers are saints, okay? Not
23 all of them, but I had my fair share.

24 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: You called it in
25 as two men fighting?

2 MR. MOTISI: Yes.

3 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: I just want to
4 get more information on it so I can look back on
5 it. Did you give your name and a phone number?

6 MR. MOTISI: No. I have called for
7 way more severe incidents than this and it still
8 takes fifteen or twenty minutes to get here.

9 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: Can you tell me
10 another one and I'll look it up.

11 THE FLOOR: I can, but I'll wait my
12 turn.

13 MR. MOTISI: The problem is, it should
14 not take that long. Then we have these people
15 running around here and they don't do anything
16 to stop them. Loitering is not illegal, I'm
17 guessing.

18 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: We're talking
19 about --

20 MR. MOTISI: Just in general. Three
21 young gentlemen, eighteen to twenty-one,
22 standing in front of my place two days ago. I
23 asked them nicely hey, can you guys not hang out
24 there. They were hanging out by my bike racks.
25 I understand the sidewalk is public property.

2 They told me to go F myself and who the hell am
3 I?

4 What am I supposed to do about a
5 situation like that? I'm not going to curse
6 them out, call the cops? What are they going to
7 do, come and tell them to leave? They should
8 not be allowed to even be there. Why isn't
9 there any presence? I'll call the cops all day
10 long. You guys will get forty calls a day. The
11 bodega does nothing to stop it. I love those
12 guys, but they do nothing. They let the people
13 hang out in the store there. There was a guy
14 they're asking for cigarettes and money.

15 MS. McDONOUGH: Kathy McDonough, 215
16 Parente Lane South. Is there a way, most of our
17 incidents seem to be between the railroad
18 traction and Sagamore Road. Is there a way that
19 we can have our officer two, three, four times
20 during the shift get out of the car, walk up and
21 down Long Beach Road?

22 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: I can chat with
23 them about doing a park, walk and talk. Is
24 there a particular time?

25 MS. McDONOUGH: All day long. There

2 is no -- ten o'clock in the morning until ten
3 o'clock at night. It's all day long.

4 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: Between the
5 railroad tracks and Sagamore?

6 MS. McDONOUGH: I don't know if anyone
7 thinks it goes further. Long Beach down to the
8 post office. They're walking up and down,
9 they're hanging out in clusters. They have
10 their backs to the building and doing whatever
11 they're doing. They need to do the park and
12 walks. We have to go back to the old days of
13 walking the beat.

14 MS. SCULLY: That's right.

15 MS. McDONOUGH: We need it for about
16 six or seven months. When I drive to Atlantic
17 Beach when I go to work, I don't drive more than
18 twenty-five miles an hour because I know that
19 cop is out there and he's going to give me a
20 ticket. Same thing in Malverne. Over here we
21 have double parking.

22 You know it was reported that we are
23 the third highest for heroin overdoses. Prior
24 to Sandy, I worked with a lot of community
25 members and members of the Board and we had

2 Chief Capese. We worked with him very well with
3 the civic and we had a contact where if a member
4 of the community said we believe that drugs are
5 being sold at a specific address, we were able
6 to pool that information, have a contact and say
7 listen, we believe drug activity is here. They
8 would go and they would investigate. A lot of
9 arrests were made that way. After Sandy, a lot
10 of people did their own thing.

11 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: We have two POP
12 officers. If there something like that, you can
13 reach out to the POP office.

14 MS. McDONOUGH: Can you give us the
15 number?

16 MS. AMBROSIA: Can I just interrupt
17 for one second? Patty Ambrosia, 239 Sunset
18 Avenue. The civic is reaching out to them to
19 come to the next civic meeting which we will
20 post on Facebook. We dealt with the POP unit
21 before. I will reach out to the officers.

22 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: So you have the
23 civic association. So you can reach out that
24 way through the civic association, and we will
25 pool our resources that way. Or you can call

2 the station house, 573-6400 and ask for the POP
3 officer.

4 MS. SCULLY: I would like to address
5 this to the officer in charge. This might be a
6 very stupid question, but years ago they used to
7 have patrolmen going up and down the street.
8 They would bang the guys on the foot when they
9 wanted them to move. No loitering.

10 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: We are not
11 allowed to walk down the street and hit people.

12 MS. SCULLY: Are patrolmen only
13 assigned or is it only cars?

14 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: They got away
15 from foot posts back in the seventies. Well,
16 sometimes we will have an officer park their car
17 and walk and talk. Get to know the community
18 and get to know the business leaders. If a 911
19 call comes in they will get back in the car.

20 MS. SCULLY: They seem to have the
21 same police car there all the time. Is he
22 assigned to Point Lookout?

23 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: Yes.

24 MS. SCULLY: Is it just here or
25 Oceanside, Long Beach, East Rockaway?

2 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: Every town has
3 their police cars. 421 car you will see in
4 Island Park all the time.

5 MS. SCULLY: That is all the time or
6 they work shifts so they can't be there
7 twenty-four hours a day, right?

8 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: We have different
9 people that fill the car.

10 MS. McDONOUGH: I know that we have
11 the same assigned car numbers. We don't have
12 the same officers, so we don't have that
13 consistency. What we truly need as far as
14 within knowing the areas.

15 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: Sometimes you
16 have an officer that works the same car.
17 Sometimes you have officers that are on a relief
18 squad which is where they will work this car
19 today and this car tomorrow and they move around
20 the precinct. If those officers are off, those
21 cars are filled with whatever officers are
22 available that day. There are officers that
23 work the car on a regular basis and they know
24 the area.

25 MS. McDONOUGH: No disrespect, when we

2 have an officer attend the Village Board
3 meetings, it's always a different officer and
4 they come and give a report, which is great,
5 except the Village Board already read the
6 report. We already know that information, now
7 when we find out there is a murder or there has
8 been an arrest for burglary, we want to know
9 what is going on in our community and we ask
10 questions. The officer that comes has no idea
11 so we get no information.

12 We want to know what is going on with
13 the town. We live here. We want to get a
14 handle on this to make it a safe environment for
15 our kids that most of us grew up in it. Most of
16 the people that live here are generational. If
17 you could send someone once a month to the Board
18 meetings that actually has an idea what is going
19 on in our community and has information, I know
20 I would appreciate that.

21 MS. KREUZBURG: Utilia Kreuzburg, 39
22 Kent Road. Back in the eighties and nineties my
23 daughters grew up here. There were three cops
24 in Island Park, 421, 420 and 417. These three
25 cops were around constantly. Nothing ever

2 happened. They saw kids on the corner, they
3 would stop them and tell them to go home. I had
4 one cop bring her home one night because she was
5 out at eight o'clock at night.

6 They knew everybody's name, everybody
7 knew them. You didn't mind having your kids
8 going out at seventeen or sixteen or fifteen and
9 come up to the corner and go to the store and
10 buy whatever. I have four grandchildren. I
11 wouldn't let them fifty feet past my house right
12 now.

13 All I'm saying is these three cops
14 knew everybody and everybody knew them. They
15 were around constantly. 421 was the Island Park
16 car. I'm here sixty years. You knew it was
17 this cop or this cop. When he needed help,
18 seventeen and twenty were right there. Why
19 can't we do that now?

20 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: You still have
21 the same cars.

22 MS. KRUEZBURG: Why don't we have the
23 same officer? I'll use Officer Bujay as an
24 example. He was the same cop here for twenty
25 years. Why can't one of the new officers be in

2 the 421 car for the next twenty years? Why do
3 they have to move around?

4 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: Some officers
5 will stay in a car and that is their post car.
6 When I got to the 3rd Precinct as a brand new
7 cop, the cop said to me, "I've been working this
8 car for twenty years." Some officers retire and
9 other officers move on to other assignments.

10 MS. KRUEZBURG: I understand they move
11 on, but you have new guys coming up. Why can't
12 we throw some of the new guys in some of these
13 guys. It would be so much better if they would
14 go up and down the street and say "hi, how are
15 you."

16 MS. SCULLY: I know your mother, you
17 better get home.

18 MS. DALTON: Rhonda Dalton, 141
19 Madison, Harbor Isle. I have a question. I
20 really don't expect you to answer it. Just
21 wondering, do they have undercovers? The
22 example I want to give you, I was sitting in my
23 car in front of DaVinci's waiting for my food.
24 This was like nine o'clock at night.

25 While I was sitting there, the Spanish

2 restaurant right next to it, I'm not familiar
3 with the name, there was a gentleman in the car
4 in front of me. Music blaring, kids are in the
5 car. A young lady coming out of the restaurant
6 back and forth back and forth handing them
7 drinks. I'm sitting here; I'm a retired cop.
8 I'm watching this. Obviously, he didn't put the
9 car in drive. If there was an undercover
10 sitting near, he could have seen there are
11 minors in the car.

12 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: You can call 911.
13 The car was sitting right there.

14 MS. DALTON: That is just one of the
15 examples. If somebody was in plain clothes they
16 would see more of that.

17 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Recently didn't we
18 have undercover cops do a sweep in Island Park?
19 Several times I've seen them.

20 MS. DALTON: I have seen it,
21 absolutely.

22 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: If that is
23 happening in front of you, you're the best
24 resource to call 911 and say this is the license
25 plate. We can get a police officer down there

2 and if the person is intoxicated and is a minor
3 in the driver's seat, they can take action.

4 MS. DALTON: I know there are like
5 solo cars here. I worked in the city.

6 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: We always have
7 two officers to every call. Two separate cars
8 will come.

9 MS. DALTON: Some things you can
10 observe.

11 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: Yes, ma'am I
12 understand.

13 MS. DALTON: My kids take a ride to
14 the library. I don't let them take their bike
15 because I'm worried about their bike. Of
16 course, I'm worried about my children.

17 MS. FAGEN: Doreen Fagen, (phonetic)
18 31 Julian Place, Island Park. I only see police
19 presence when I call 911, which has been quite
20 often lately. I've been physically attacked by
21 my neighbor, accosted by my neighbor, and
22 looking out of my window seeing a drug deal
23 right on my corner. Drugs that go up and down.
24 Even though the Village locked up our friendly
25 neighborhood drug dealer, who by the way rented

2 from the Pacciones, he's in jail and has other
3 people running his business.

4 I can't begin to tell what you is
5 going on there. A nightmare. I had three cop
6 cars at my house last night because I dialed 911
7 again. Ten days ago, two cop cars, but only
8 when I dial nine one one. We are watching drug
9 activity. By the time we call them, the woman
10 told me, you know what you need to do, you need
11 to start videotaping these people.

12 I don't walk my dog with my cell
13 phone, the. Last night I was attacked again so
14 the cops come again after my fiance dialed 911.
15 We need a more positive police presence where
16 people are watching. I've seen the neighbors
17 take their own garbage, who should not be
18 dumping anything, and putting it in the
19 apartment building's Dumpster; that is illegal.
20 You have a pail. It's disgusting. The drug
21 activity that the goes on, it's horrible.

22 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: Which house is
23 it?

24 THE FLOOR: 27 Quebec Road. 27 Right
25 of Way.

2 THE FLOOR: I have to dial 911. She
3 says to me, take video. She told me last night.
4 I didn't get a police report. Last night the
5 lady and her boyfriend threatened to run my son
6 over. My son is twenty-seven years old. Why
7 are we even going there? I can't understand.
8 There is no police presence there. There's so
9 much drug activity. The bodega, you have to see
10 them going in and out. There is a whole bunch
11 of activity there. That was Billy J's favorite
12 stop. He would go there fifteen times a night.
13 Nobody noticed that?

14 MS. SARNELLI: Joellen
15 S-A-R-N-E-L-L-I, 245 Jefferson Avenue, Harbor
16 Isle. I have a really simple question. I just
17 want to know how many dedicated cars do we have
18 full-time in this community right now?

19 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: The
20 post-boundaries haven't changed. It's been the
21 same number of cars all the time. One twenty.

22 MS. SARNELLI: I asked you a specific
23 question.

24 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: You have three
25 cars that cover the entire area. They're always

2 in this area that it is where there dedicated
3 to.

4 MR. SARNELLI: Twenty-four hours,
5 three cars.

6 MS. SCULLY: Is that Island Park?

7 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: It's the area.

9 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: Excuse me,
10 she has the floor.

11 TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: It's the
12 Incorporated Village, Barnum Isle and Harbor
13 Isle.

14 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: Yes.

15 MS. SARNELLI: You Know up there we
16 don't have three cars in that area twenty-four
17 hours a day. We don't. Maybe three cars cover
18 twenty-four hours.

19 TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: They go somewhere
20 else.

21 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: The post
22 boundaries haven't changed. There are a certain
23 of number of cars in the 4th Precinct and those
24 boundaries are broken down. Those cars are for
25 that area. Once in a while they will go to

3 TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: Joellen, if
4 something happens in Oceanside the car is
5 supposed to be here. They will go to Oceanside.

6 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: It depends on --

7 TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: They're not here
8 twenty-four hours.

9 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: It's assigned to
10 this particular post, but when 911 is called we
11 have a certain number of cars and we will take
12 them.

13 MS. SARNELLI: In all fairness, I will
14 tell you we don't have police presence here at
15 all. They may be in those areas and when we
16 call 911 they will come here. You wouldn't get
17 a stop and talk unless you assign a car to this
18 area. It's not happening. I don't mean to be
19 nasty.

20 TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: You know we love
21 Island Park. She just said she is going to do
22 that.

23 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: I will talk to
24 the officers.

25 MS. SARNELLI: What are you asking?

2 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: To encourage them
3 to do more walk and talk and do more
4 enforcement. That is why I came here, to
5 interact with the community. I wanted to meet
6 you find, out what are some of the issues that
7 you have. And now you can go back and speak to
8 my officers.

9 MS. SARNELLI: I think we need
10 something a little more concrete. We need at
11 least one dedicated car here for twenty-four
12 hours. I'm sensing that is not the case. They
13 will travel a certain perimeter and when needed
14 they will go to that area.

15 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: If you have two
16 people in Island Park call 911, I will need four
17 officers, .

18 MS. SARNELLI: If that is the case I'm
19 going to say it's not enough. What I'm hearing,
20 I am asking that question but I don't hear the
21 answer.

22 MS. SCULLY: We don't have a car
23 dedicated, if is what they're telling us.

24 MS. DALTON: If someone gets hurt,
25 you provided us with a car. That car is on

2 paper they might be assigned if something
3 happens, they go somewhere else. Like 23, if
4 someone gets hurt and has to be taken to the
5 hospital.

6 MS. SARNELLI: I want to be clear on
7 what we are saying. We don't really have a
8 dedicated car here. I think with that in mind,
9 that is why, it's a small community. We have a
10 lot of vagrancy. People are aware of our lack
11 of enforcement. We have a lot of drug issues
12 here and vagrancy.

13 I think we need to look -- the
14 conversation that I'm having right here, more
15 than what can we do. That is why it's
16 happening. We don't have enough police presence
17 here. You tell me there are three cars, they
18 service an area. They're not servicing the
19 community. That is misleading, frankly, by
20 saying that to me.

21 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: The Village has
22 meetings set up with the Nassau County Police
23 and Long Island Railroad when the mayor gets
24 back from his vacation. I appreciate the offer
25 of park, walk and talk. I think we have to take

2 small steps. If we can start with that, let's
3 start with that.

4 MS. SARNELLI: With all due respect,
5 Irene, small steps is not going to do it.

6 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: We will have meetings
7 and work with the Nassau County Police
8 Department and Long Island Railroad. Next month
9 you will have more information. We all hear
10 what are you saying. We live here. We feel the
11 same way. We have had an open relationship.

12 I thank you for coming down. I know
13 it's short notice. We watch Facebook. I see
14 Nassau County Police going down Parma Road and
15 jumping out of a van undercover and a bunch of
16 kids being arrested. I see MTA here in the
17 morning on Saturday. I go to the deli, the MTA
18 police is here. Three or four weeks ago they
19 had a dog sniffing on the train. Thank you so
20 much for coming.

21 INSPECTOR KAMINSKY: I have to be
22 somewhere. I'm sorry.

23 (Whereupon, at 7:52 p.m., Inspector
24 Kaminisky left the meeting.)

25 MR. DAPELLI: Carlos D-A-P-E-L-L-I. I

2 own Fluffy Angels Grooming. I won't be a broken
3 record. I'll be quick. I'm concerned because
4 my wife was harassed by that same gentleman
5 everyone talks about on Facebook asking for
6 money. All day from eight in the morning or

8 Road from the train station all the way past my
9 store. She is not here any more, but we need
10 more police presence.

11 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: I believe
12 when she leaves here she will talk with her
13 officers today or tomorrow. We are not letting
14 this go either.

15 MR. DAPALLI: It concerns me.

16 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: I have
17 children and grandchildren here. I'm very
18 concerned. We all hear.

19 MS. LOBEL: We are coming here
20 complaining. We want to hear what is going to
21 be done.

22 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: All these
23 complaints are being written down and they will
24 be brought up in a joint meeting. What steps do
25 we take. This will be brought back to you, what

2 steps are going to be taken. If there are some
3 things being done undercover that they don't
4 want to talk about --

5 MS. LOBEL: Ninety-five percent of the
6 complaints are coming from the SAIL home.
7 Something has to be done with them. It's like a
8 village full of zombies. That is what we see.
9 It's not normal people walking around.

10 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA:
11 Unfortunately, they have rights.

12 MS. LOBEL: They have more rights than
13 we do.

14 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: We had
15 somebody removed and if we need to do more,
16 we will do more.

17 MS. LOBEL: We have to live with that
18 forever?

19 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: A judge will
20 not take the home out of here. May change the
21 residents, but won't take the home out of here.

22 MS. LOBEL: I called a realtor to see
23 how much I can sell my house for. He said,
24 "miss, you live in a real rough neighborhood.
25 I'm going to tell you something. You can't sell

2 your house; you're going to be buried in your
3 backyard."

4 MS. CALIFANO: I wanted you to all
5 know I wrote a letter to the village attorney.

9 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: The trustee
10 is not here at this time. I'm not going to
11 entertain this. No.

12 MS. CALIFANO: There is a lot of drug
13 activity on that whole area. This is what is
14 going on with the police department. It's not
15 what they're doing. It's who they are, they let
16 go of them and it's because of their political
17 connections. Joe, you know what is going on at
18 the end of Quebec Road and Right of Way.

19 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: I have faith
20 they're going to do something. We will be in
21 the meetings and watch the stuff progress.

22 MS. CALIFANO: Why isn't there an
23 answer from the village attorney?

24 MS. BOLAND: I have no idea what are
25 you talking about. I never received a letter

3 MS. CALIFANO: I will send another
4 letter to you.

5 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: One more
6 question. I want to finish our meeting. We
7 stopped the meeting for the police and we will

9 MS. RAGAN: Hope Ragan, 39 Kent Road.
10 It's not have much of a question as a comment.
11 At one of the last meetings or last couple of
12 meetings, everyone said we need a police
13 presence. Within a couple of weeks the town was
14 flooded with undercover cops. I know this
15 because I harassed them about beach tags at
16 least a dozen times because I never saw them
17 before and they were on the beach and asked them
18 for beach tags. And they showed me their
19 badges.

20 You have to give it time to go into
21 place. Everybody can come here and yell and
22 fight. You will not get the change that you
23 want implemented in a day. I want to thank you
24 guys for set up the process and having the
25 undercovers here because I think it did make a

2 difference. It may not have made a difference
3 that everybody demanded immediately, but it made
4 a bit of a difference. What you saw on Parma I
5 witnessed in King Kullen on three separate
6 occasions. It has to take time.

9 MS. DALTON: I want to clarify the
10 idea of cameras. They use it in the city. They
11 monitor the cameras for crime activity.

12 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: We do have cameras
13 on Long Beach Road.

14 MS. CALIFANO: They do not work.
15 There was an accident there. The girl that was
16 hit, they couldn't take pictures of it.

17 MS. CONROY: We are in the process of
18 getting them up and running.

19 TRUSTEE VOLPE-RIED: They're not up
20 and running.

21 MS. ROTHMAN: What is the date that
22 you expect them to be working?

23 MS. CONROY: I have to get back to
24 you.

25 DEPUTY MAYOR ANNARELLA: I'm going to
