2 (Following recitation of the Pledge of
3 Allegiance, the meeting was called to order.)

4 MAYOR MCGINTY: Madam Clerk, the roll
5 please.

6 MS. CONROY: Trustee Barbara
7 Volpe-Ried.

8 MAYOR MCGINTY: Excused.

9 MS. CONROY: Trustee Matthew
10 Paccione.

11 TRUSTEE PACCIONE: Present.

12 MS. CONROY: Trustee Irene Naudus.

13 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Present.

14 MS. CONROY: Deputy Mayor Joseph
15 Annarella.

16 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Present.

17 MS. CONROY: Village Attorney Susan
18 Boland.

19 MS. BOLAND: Present.

20 MS. CONROY: Mayor Michael McGinty.

21 MAYOR MCGINTY: Yes, ma'am. Madam
22 Clerk, the reports of the commissioners, please.

23 MS. CONROY: Trustee Barbara
24 Volpe-Ried's beach report.

25 TRUSTEE PACCIONE: October 21st is the



1 10/19/17 Board of Trustees meeting
2 2nd Annual Halloween Bootacular at Masone Beach
3 from 11:00 to 2:00. We have placed banners
4 around the Village and reminded everyone on the
5 website and social media pages. Also, flyers
6 may be picked up at Village Hall.

7 As many of you know, the next few
8 months in the Village are very busy. We have a
9 few important events. As a remainder for all
10 residents and visitors, we will be placing
11 banners throughout the Village at various
12 locations along Long Beach Road. Please also
13 visit the Village website, and you can pick up
14 some fliers over here on the right-hand side.

15 The new 2018-19 calendar is in the
16 process of being created. We encourage
17 residents to submit photos to use in the
18 calendar. If you would like to submit pictures
19 for the Village calendar, please drop them off
20 at Village Hall during normal business hours or
21 e-mail your pictures and contact information to
22 Melissa Mele at Village Hall. Any questions

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2 MS. CONROY: Public Safety report,
3 please.

4 TRUSTEE PACCIONE: Nassau County
5 Police Department. Eight arrests in the
6 Village, twelve moving violations, thirteen
7 parking violations, forty-one aided cases and
8 one burglary reported, residential, on Kildare
9 Road.

10 Fire department, there were fifty-one
11 signal nines, five second signal nines, one
12 signal nine, aided member. Seven general
13 alarms, one still alarm.4 One water rescue, ten
14 signal nines, mutual aid, one mutual fire, for a
15 total of seventy-seven calls.

16 In addition, last time at the last
17 Board meeting, I know people were asking about
18 the cameras on Long Beach Road. Two will be
19 installed on Long Beach Road and one at the Long
20 Island Railroad station. They should be up by
21 next week. Respectfully submitted.

22 MS. CONROY: Planning and Zoning,
23 please.

24 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Building permits
25 were issued for the following addresses in

18 A Certificate of Occupancy was issued

21 A Certificate of Completion was issued

23 Road, 18 Lorraine Road, 71 Nassau Lane, 111
24 Nassau Lane, two, 15 Norfolk Road, 29 Redfield
25 Road, two, 45 Sagamore Road, two, and 7 Southard



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2 Drive.

3 The following cases were heard on
4 September 27th: Case Number 2217, Balabanick,
5 19 Hastings Road, Island Park. Variance to
6 construct a two story, one family home on a
7 substandard lot with one side yard aggregate.
8 Property located at south side of Hastings Road.

9 Case Number 2317, Versace, 196 Quebec
10 Road, Island Park, New York. Variance to
11 subdivide existing property, maintain existing
12 dwelling on a lesser lot and propose to
13 construct new family dwelling.

14 The following cases will be heard on
15 October 25th. Monteverde, 24.17, 44 Kildare
16 Road, Island Park. Variance to maintain
17 existing detached garage on a lot with
18 insufficient lot coverage. Property located on
19 the west side of Kildare Road.

20 25.17, Monteverde, 44 Kildare Road,
21 Island Park, variance to construct a second curb
22 cut which will exceed max limit of fourteen
23 feet. Property located on northbound Warwick
24 Road. Respectfully submitted.

25 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Public Works. The



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2 following was collected in September: Two
3 hundred twenty-nine point sixty-four tons of
4 municipal solid waste. Nine point forty tons
5 of mixed glass. All the streetlights and meters
6 reported not working have been or are being
7 repaired at this time. All Village owned
8 property is being maintained. Village parking
9 lots are being restriped. Cleaning and closing
10 of the beach, we are in the process of that now.
11 Still working on getting the snow equipment
12 ready for the upcoming season and we're working
13 on getting a concrete contractor to do some work
14 on some Village property that has to be done.
15 We don't have a contractor so we will get one
16 and get the work done in the Village. That's my
17 report, Mayor.

18 TRUSTEE PACCIONE: Code Enforcement.
19 Twenty-eight tickets were issued for no parking
20 permit. Forty-two for expired meter. Thirteen
21 for out of stall. Seventeen backed into stall.
22 One blocked crosswalk. Four for no commercial
23 parking. Forty-nine restricted parking. One
24 for blocking driveway. Fifty-six alternate side
25 of the street. Five blocking bus. Two no



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2 handicapped permit. One in traveled portion of
3 the road. Thirty-nine expired inspection.
4 Thirty-one expired registration. One improper
5 plate and one no front plate, for a total of
6 three hundred and three.

7 MAYOR MCGINTY: With regard to the
8 hazardous mitigation program, we have been told
9 that Homeland Security is in receipt of all our
10 deliverables, including the modeling study,
11 drainage reports and documentation that all
12 drains have been cleaned. Homeland Security is
13 pushing forward with its due diligence.

14 DSHES, which is the New York State
15 version, has formally requested a roll-over from
16 surplus funds from Phase 1, so we are waiting
17 for the next step. We know that we are on the
18 radar to move forward.

19 We are progressing with the
20 replacements of fuel tanks at the DPW garage.
21 The design phase for the fuel tanks has been
22 completed with an eye to several improvements at
23 the DPW site. We will be entering into an
24 intermunicipal agreement with the Town of
25 Hempstead to utilize the Town's fuel depot as a



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2 cost saving measure during construction;
3 otherwise, we would be going retail and we don't
4 want that.

5 We made progress with our project for
6 resiliency and hardening at the Village's
7 Emergency Management Operations Center, which
8 is the second floor of the firehouse. The land
9 surveyor, Russell Lewis of Dix Hills, has
10 completed the property survey in conjunction
11 with mark-outs performed by the utility
12 companies. And we are working with the utility
13 companies, in this case National Grid in
14 particular, on a pilot project to provide gas
15 and electric at reduced rates with more
16 efficient equipment. The cost to the Village is
17 minimal, if at all. And over time should
18 produce a slight revenue stream.

19 Design and pre-construction schedules
20 have been set up by our consultant H2M shared
21 with the utilities companies as well as
22 Governor's Office. The structural review has
23 been undertaken to ascertain the integrity of
24 the fire department building in toto, which is
25 part of the regulations that we have to follow.



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2 With regard to the Nassau County
3 shared services project. We are concentrating
4 on capital improvements through the Long Beach
5 Road business corridor, in conjunction with the
6 Governor's Office and Dormitory Authority. The
7 proposed agreement rests with the county
8 legislature and its committee system at this
9 time.

10 We continue to work with Perkins
11 Eastman, which is the well reknown planning
12 company that the governor sent down on the
13 transit oriented planning study for the Long
14 Beach Road business corridor. Nassau County
15 joined us in the effort. We will make further
16 improvements for the passive pocket park, which,
17 as you know, is the site of the former Village
18 Hall building. We are planning to transport the
19 present compliment of trailers and determine
20 their ultimate resolution.

21 The Village Hall has a permanent home
22 in the former Bank of America building. The
23 official grand opening will be Saturday,
24 November 4th, ten a.m. It represents another
25 step in the rebirth and renaissance in the



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2 Village. In addition, we are working with New
3 York State, Empire Solar and PSEG and the
4 Village on an extensive project to build solar
5 farms, which will be on municipal buildings. It
6 will provide savings to the Village, and Empire
7 will be reaching out to the Village residents to
8 see if anyone is intereststed in joining the
9 grid.

10 Inspector, great to see you. But I
11 can I finish this one comment, Inspector
12 Steinberg?

13 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: Sure.

14 MAYOR MCGINTY: Do you have a minute?

15 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: Take your time.
16 I apologize for being late.

17 MAYOR MCGINTY: PSE&G is helping us
18 with the purchase of two electric cars. And
19 Power Solar, in conjunction with New York State,
20 has applied for a grant that we have been told
21 that we are going to receive. That grant will
22 be for electric charging stations, one of which
23 will be at the new Village Hall, one will be at
24 the DPW garage. Upon receipt of the electric
25 cars, we will be excising that inventory of the



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2 fleet that is no longer of use to us.

3 Once again, we are looking for the
4 continued greening of Island Park a reduction of
5 the carbon footprint and always, always cutting
6 spending. Thank you.

7 Inspector, thanks for your patience.
8 Sergeant, good to see you.

9 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: Good to see you.
10 Again, I know I was here last month. There were
11 some questions about the papers and things at
12 the train station. The train station continues
13 to be a focus with us. There is continued
14 narcotics activity there, but we constantly have
15 units there, and last month we made three
16 arrests. Anyone have any questions for me?

17 MAYOR MCGINTY: Would you apologize to
18 the undercover officers? (Laughter)

19 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: They came to town
20 last night and parked in the Village parking lot
21 and our code enforcement officers did not
22 realize it was an undercover police car, and
23 gave them a ticket. They nicely knocked on the
24 door and they flashed their badges and they
25 asked us, did you give us this ticket? We were



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2 like, oh, my god, but we waved the ticket. They
3 were very grateful.

4 MS. McDONOUGH: Kathleen McDonough,
5 215 Parente Lane South. Not last month but the
6 month before there was a representative from the
7 Nassau County Police Department who was
8 gathering ideas. I don't recall her name or her
9 position. One of the things the community
10 talked about was maybe having an officer for
11 patrol for a little while just to see what was
12 happening. Any of those ideas coming to
13 fruition?

14 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: We have talked
15 to the patrol guys. It's going to be impossible
16 to get a dedicated officer. We try to encourage
17 the park, walk and talk. If there is a specific
18 time or specific area, you can go to the
19 precinct, Deputy Inspector Kominsky. She will
20 forward it to me and I can forward it to my
21 troops. If there is a meeting or something
22 where you can go do a foot patrol, we can
23 certainly delegate that. Is there's a specific
24 time or function that you were looking for the
25 foot patrols.



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2 MS. McDONOUGH: Mainly between
3 Sagamore and the train station on the west side.

4 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: Traffic for
5 people hanging out. Any specific times?

6 MS. McDONOUGH: It varies, so really
7 if they're driving down Long Beach Road and they
8 see a lot of people hanging out or a lot of
9 people double parked, which causes pedestrians
10 and school buses to drive around. It could be
11 in the afternoon during the week, anything to
12 show a police presence.

13 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: Absolutely. I
14 strictly work nights, but I will go back to
15 Officer Kominsky and let her know and try to get
16 some feedback.

17 MS. McDONOUGH: Another concern that I
18 had along with the residents was just to have
19 the same officer come to our meetings, which I
20 know is hard because of the scheduling, but
21 somebody who knows something about the report.
22 They read the report and then you come in and
23 read the same report. If there are eight or
24 nine arrests, we would like to have an idea of
25 what is going on in the community so we can be



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2 more proactive.

3 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: Usually a
4 supervisor is supposed to attend, depending how
5 busy it is. I always have the east end of the
6 precinct. I will be here about fifty percent of
7 the time. With that being said, the best course
8 of action is if somebody here e-mails the
9 inspector prior to. If I'm not able to make it
10 I can speak to them. If you have a specific
11 question.

12 Obviously I can't go over every
13 arrest. We spoke about it at the last meeting.
14 The only thing is congregating at the train
15 station, people coming back from Long Beach and
16 this and that. We know about it.

17 MS. McDONOUGH: I appreciate all of
18 your hard work. It's not a bash. If they see a
19 car or a policeman, they're less likely to do
20 something.

21 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: Going forward, I
22 think an e-mail is a good idea.

23 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: We have been doing
24 that and actually been working with the MTA.
25 They have showed such a force here. They are at



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2 that train station every weekend, every morning,
3 every afternoon. They actually went on a couple
4 of weeks ago with the dogs sniffing for drugs.
5 They stopped the train from Long Beach. Between
6 Nassau County and the MTA we are blessed. I see
7 you guys, I leave at seven o'clock in the
8 morning, I see you at the firehouse and over
9 here. I'm a Facebook person. I'm watching what
10 residents are saying. They're saying Nassau
11 County has a presence in Island Park and I thank
12 you for that.

13 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: There are some
14 narcotics, but the good new is there is almost
15 hardly any ancillary crime associated with that,
16 as far as cars getting broken into or robberies
17 or there other crimes. They're not going to
18 report it.

19 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: I have to agree with
20 you. I live on Newport Road and I have had OD's
21 on my block. I watch it and get it and I listen
22 to three neighbors tell me that their cars were
23 broken into. Did you call the police? No, but
24 they went on Facebook. Facebook is not doing
25 anything.



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2 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: I live in
3 Northport and it's the same exact thing. There
4 was a van following kids. No one knew it. I
5 called the 6th Precinct and nobody knew anything
6 about it. It was totally unsubstantiated. The
7 best thing to do is call 911 if you have
8 something to report.

9 As far as general information, all of
10 us are pretty approachable, especially the
11 deputy inspector or the administrative
12 supervisor. They'll give you a heads up.

13 MR. MICHELSON: Steven Michelson, 11
14 Julian. Last weekend we were at Newburger and
15 there was a Japanese car going up and down
16 Austin Boulevard in excess of a hundred miles
17 per hour. The owner of Newburger called the
18 police. I'm wondering if you know anything
19 about it.

20 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: Unfortunately,
21 the way our schedule rotates, it's hard to
22 follow up on that. When it comes to someone
23 speeding up and down the roadway, unless we
24 really observe it, it's hard to place the person
25 under arrest. If you know it's the same car,



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2 same time, same area, let us know.

3 MR. MICHELSON: He was going back and
4 forth over and over again. I'll try to get the
5 plates.

6 MS. AMBROSIA: Patty Ambrosia, 239
7 Sunset Avenue. What you guys are talking about,
8 4410 Austin Boulevard, a new place opened up. A
9 carpet place is on one corner, the boxing place
10 is on the other corner. Down there is like a
11 driveway. That is where all these cars are
12 going in. I don't know what they put in their
13 engines, but they're racing.

14 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: Is there a body
15 shop there?

16 MS. AMBROSIA: There is something back
17 there.

18 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: Okay, I will
19 check it out.

20 MR. MICHELSON: The owner of Newburger
21 said there is a triangle, there is a Trendz
22 barbershop. People are congregating there.
23 There's a body shop there. He said that is
24 where these cars are serviced.

25 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: Usually, you go



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2 down there, write a bunch of summonses, you
3 never hear from them again.

4 MS. AMBROSIA: Overdosed Performance.

5 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: I will check it
6 out.

7 MS. LEIS: Darlene L-E-I-S, 16
8 Kildare, Island Park. As matter of fact, last
9 month I spoke to you on my way in.

10 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: I remember that.

11 MS. LEIS: Last month there was a
12 break-in in a car in front of my home. It was
13 about five-thirty. The people across the way
14 from me, they caught the, from what I gather,
15 the fellow breaking in was wearing hoody on
16 video on a camera that he had recently installed
17 in his home.

18 Then the fellow, I don't know whether
19 there was one or two, they went down the block
20 and I believe it was like 26 Kildare Road, in
21 that area. They tried to break into the home.
22 I don't know if you heard anything further.

23 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: I haven't heard
24 anything.

25 MS. LEIS: It was reported. They had



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2 the police there and detectives also.

3 THE SERGEANT: It was an abandoned
4 house.

5 MS. LEIS: No, I don't know whether
6 they actually got into the house, but it was
7 reported and they had Crime Scene down there.
8 I'm surprised that you didn't know anything
9 about it.

10 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: What I will do
11 for you is definitely follow up on this and next
12 meeting I'll try to report.

13 MS. LEIS: I'm just curious if they
14 continued on down the block.

15 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: No, there were no
16 other reports.

17 MS. LEIS: So you did know about it?

18 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: It is on the
19 report on September 12th there was a residential
20 burglary. I have to follow up whether there was
21 an arrest made on it or not.

22 MS. LEIS: Thank you.

23 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: I apologize I
24 was late.

25 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: That's okay.



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2 INSPECTOR STEINBERG: Lock your cars.
3 That's all I have to say.

4 MAYOR MCGINTY: Madam Clerk, the
5 calendar, please.

6 MS. CONROY: Resolved that the
7 abstract of audited vouchers for the month of
8 October, 2017 be approved for payment.

9 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Motion.

10 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Second.

11 MAYOR MCGINTY: On the motion.

12 (Whereupon, all Board members voted
13 affirmatively.)

14 MS. CONROY: Resolved that the Board
15 of Trustees has reviewed the financial
16 statements for the month of September, 2017.

17 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Motion.

18 TRUSTEE PACCIONE: Second.

19 MAYOR MCGINTY: On the motion.

20 (Whereupon, all Board members voted
21 affirmatively.)

22 MS. CONROY: Resolved that all Board
23 meeting minutes recorded from September 14, 2017
24 to October 18, 2017 stand as written without any
25 corrections, additions or deletions.



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2 TRUSTEE PACCIONE: So move.

3 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Second.

4 MAYOR MCGINTY: On the motion.

5 (Whereupon, all Board members voted
6 affirmatively.)

7 MAYOR MCGINTY: Madam Clerk, the
8 following resolution dealing with Sagamore
9 Lights, I would ask for a motion to put that
10 resolution on hold, please. Motion.

11 TRUSTEE PACCIONE: Tabled, so moved.

12 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Second.

13 MAYOR MCGINTY: On the motion.

14 (Whereupon, all Board members voted
15 affirmatively.)

16 MS. CONROY: The Mayor made the
17 following appointments: Steven Michelson,
18 member Zoning of Board for a term to expire
19 April 5, 2021.

20 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: I'll make it.

21 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Can I just say a few
22 words?

23 MAYOR MCGINTY: Let's vote and then
24 you can.

25 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Aye.



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2 (Whereupon, all Board members voted
3 affirmatively.)

4 MAYOR MCGINTY: Go ahead.

5 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Steven, I welcome
6 you to our Zoning Board. I think you will be an
7 asset to this Village of Island Park. You are
8 dedicated to the Village. You will help us, you
9 will work with us and you will make good things
10 happen, and me, Matt and myself were the ones
11 that went to the Mayor and this Board and said
12 we thought you would be a good candidate and I'm
13 thankful that you accepted, and I welcome you to
14 the Zoning Board. And your history with your
15 father was overwhelming.

16 MAYOR MCGINTY: Trustee Naudus is
17 alluding to the fact that his dad, this is the
18 second generation of Michelsons to serve the
19 Village. In the sixties his dad was a member of
20 the Planning Board and other endeavors. Welcome
21 to the Board. Thank you.

22 MS. CONROY: Resolved that the Mayor
23 is authorized to hire Logan Rizzo as a full-time
24 laborer to replace Tayron Hardware at a salary
25 of \$28,000.00 per year and he will be eligible



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2 for all benefits provided by the Village after
3 six months' probation.

4 MAYOR MCGINTY: Motion.

5 TRUSTEE PACCIONE: So move.

6 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Second.

7 MAYOR MCGINTY: On the motion.

8 MS. CONROY: Resolved that the Mayor
9 is authorized to sign a contract with Barnum
10 Island Fire District for a two year fire
11 protection and emergency services agreement.

12 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Motion.

13 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Second.

14 MAYOR MCGINTY: On the motion.

15 (Whereupon, all Board members voted
16 affirmatively.)

17 MS. CONROY: Resolved that the Mayor
18 is authorized to sign a contract with Penflex,
19 Incorporated for administrative services of the
20 Fire Department Service Award Program for the
21 period of November 1, 2017 to October 31, 2017.

22 TRUSTEE PACCIONE: So move.

23 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Second.

24 MAYOR MCGINTY: On the motion.

25 (Whereupon, all Board members voted



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2 affirmatively.)

3 MS. CONROY: Whereas, the Village is
4 participating in the New York Rising community
5 reconstruction program; and,

6 Whereas, the Village desires to retain
7 the services of a project manager to oversee the
8 critical facilities resiliency firehouse
9 hardening project; and,

10 Whereas, the Village issued a notice
11 to bidders for project management of Community
12 Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery
13 Projects; and,

14 Whereas, the Village received a
15 proposal from Armand Corporation for three
16 hundred twenty-two thousand one hundred
17 thirty-seven dollars; and,

18 And whereas, the Village received a
19 proposal from Walden Environment Engineering for
20 services to be billed in accordance with their
21 hourly rate schedule.

22 Now therefore be it resolved that the
23 Mayor is authorized to sign a contract with
24 Walden Environmental Engineering for project
25 management services to be billed in accordance



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2 with their hourly rate schedule.

3 TRUSTEE PACCIONE: So move.

4 TRUSTEE NAUDUS: Second.

5 MAYOR MCGINTY: On the motion.

6 (Whereupon, all Board members voted
7 affirmatively.)

8 MS. CONROY: Whereas, the Village is a
9 participant in the New York Rising Community
10 Reconstruction Program, and;

11 Whereas, the Village desires to select
12 a Downtown Revitalization and Transit Oriented
13 Development Plan;

14 Now therefore be it resolved that the
15 Mayor is authorized to select Project Option 3
16 for implementation from the Island Park Downtown
17 Revitalization and Transit Oriented Development
18 Plan with the Dormitory Authority of the State
19 of New York, the Housing Trust Fund Corporation
20 and the Governor's Office of Storm Recovery.

21 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: I'll make it.
