

- 15 report. The following was collected in
- 16 November: two hundred point twenty-two tons of
- 17 municipal solid waste. Twelve point four tons
- 18 of agricultural waste. Eight point twenty-two
- 19 tons mixed glass. All streetlights and meters
- 20 that were reported not working have been
- 21 repaired. All Village owned property being
- 22 maintained.
- We finished putting up the holiday
- 24 lighting with the menorah and nativity scene.
- 25 Street sweepers are out and will continue to be

I have a 6 list of the streets for that. That is all part 7 of that forty million dollars. The street work and finished preparation for the snow equipment, 8 9 we are still working on that. We are almost 10 done with the snow. We put five hundred yards of sand on Little Beach and built up a berm to 11 12 try to protect the area. 13 Couple of small trees taken down by 14 the village crew. We had a temporary stop on 15 taking down trees. We finally got FEMA 16 hopefully convinced to reimburse us for trees 17 taken down. We have an arborist coming in that 18 has to take a picture of every tree and measure 19 every tree and then we can get the blessing on 20 that and take it down and get reimbursed. 21 Some street signs were put up. - 4 Summonses, there were thirty-six given out.
- 5 Accidents, there were three. Aided cases,
- 6 twenty-one.
- 7 Island Park Fire Department. Signal
- 8 alarms, twenty-eight. General alarms, ten.
- 9 Still alarms, one. Mutual aid, three. Aided
- 10 members, five, for a total of forty-seven.
- 11 Code Enforcement Island Park for the
- 12 month. No parking permit, fifty-two. Expired
- 13 meter, fifty-two. Out of stall, 13. Back into
- 14 stall, 11. Fire hydrant, two. No commercial
- 15 parking, three. Restricted parking, eighteen.
- 16 Alternate street parking, forty-three. Left on
- 17 curb, one. House collection, in other words,
- 18 garbage was out before seven p.m., there was one
- 19 ticket given out. More than twelve inches from
- 20 the curb, one. Traveling portion of the road,
- 21 four. Expired inspection, three. Expired
- 22 registration, three.
- Two hundred fifty-five tickets given
- 24 out, and that is my report. I would like to add
- 25 to my report, I forgot to report we purchased

- 3 will see them going up in the business district

- I would also like to wish everybody

- 7 MAYOR McGINTY: Trustee Annarella,
- 8 forgive me you forgot to discuss Nassau County
- 9 is bringing a sewer flushing truck back to the
- 10 Village on a semi-regular basis. Over the
- 11 summer there was a sewer inspection of all the
- 12 sewer lines. After you do the flushing and
- 13 inspection there will be a closed circuit camera
- 14 inspection of those. As we move forward with
- 15 this reconstruction of the Village
- 16 infrastructure, we are trying to cross all our
- 17 T's and dot all our I's.
- MR. MICHAELS: Are they permanent
- 19 cameras put in the sewer line?
- MAYOR McGINTY: No. On Friday,
- 21 December 3rd, we had a meeting with the DEC.
- 22 They have a new director out there. Cara Reiss
- 23 Gallagher. The gas station on the corner of
- 24 Sagamore and Long Beach Road, the owner is
- 25 seeking an extension from the Nassau County Fire

- 2 Marshal for an additional time to pull the
- 3 tanks.
- We are in opposition to that
- 5 extension. As of a month ago, the tank
- 6 pressure, the tanks were under a pressure test.
- 7 They were successful. Those tanks are not
- 8 leaking. There are peripheral test borings
- 9 taking place, according to Ms. Gomez. She is
- 10 going to do some test borings on the peripheral
- 11 of the property and then she found some federal
- 12 money to pay for the site inspection of that gas
- 13 station.
- 14 We have asked for an expedited
- 15 schedule. We are waiting to hear about that.
- 16 In other words, we don't want to wait for spring
- 17 for the peripheral test borings.
- 18 Swan Fey on Waterford Road, the DEC
- 19 came and they sent a Merit Consulting Group down
- 20 and the contamination was de minimis. Only one
- 21 test tank had minor contamination. The DEC is
- 22 going to keep the file open, but there is no
- 23 danger to residents and there is no remedial
- 24 action necessary. Again, that is verified with
- 25 the DEC, Cara Reiss Gallagher.

The one question that the DEC had,
well two questions, where do we get the water
from. Do any of our residents drill into the
aquifer for their own water for their gardens.
The answer upon inspection, the answer is no.
At this time there is no danger to any residence
to from that Swan Fey situation on the Quebec
Road property.
There are still some outstanding
issues. There has been a partial clean-up site
specific relative to where the new housing is.
Right now, the new owner is in discussions with
the DEC in terms of future clean-up. You should
know that the gas station located just to the
south of South Shore Auto Body, the clean-up has
been just to the south, same side of the street,
west side. That clean-up has been completed and
the DEC is scheduled to perform a final review.
That's that.




